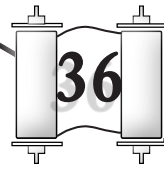

CLERGY'S HOLIDAY MESSAGE

THIRTY-SIX YEARS AGO, *double chai*, in the summer of 1974, a handful of Jewish souls gathered to discuss the possibility of a Jewish communal organization in the Rancho Bernardo-Poway-Escondido area. Until then, North County Inland had not known any organized Jewish presence. Things moved very quickly. By February of 1975 the group incorporated as the Bernardo Jewish Community. We enthusiastically launched regular services, holiday celebrations and a religious school. One year later we affiliated with the Reform Movement. By 1977, we had partnered with our first full-time Rabbi and in 1978 we changed our name to Temple Adat Shalom. By 1980, we had purchased our current site.

Over our short yet brilliant history we have grown from a hopeful beginning of 40 pioneers to a full and vibrant Jewish community known throughout the North County Inland area. Our contribution to Jewish life has extended beyond our founders' dreams and our presence and participation in the wider general neighborhood has fostered new understanding and appreciation for diversity among religious organizations, schools and neighborhoods alike. Our accomplishments are myriad; we have much to be very proud of. We owe infinite gratitude to all of those who dreamed, toiled and led the way to this season.

As we enter into this New Year, our levels of participation and enthusiasm are thriving across the age spectrum. Clergy, laity and staff are engaged together in rare and uplifting partnership. Volunteering - long a hallmark of our congregation - continues stronger than ever. For our size, we boast an amazingly impressive offering of programs, educational opportunities, and worship experiences. What a wonderful staging ground for the next 18 years and beyond!

It is our fervent prayer that, throughout this Holy Day season, and indeed throughout this anniversary year of celebration, our beautiful "shul in the country" will only increase in the vibrancy, warmth and innovation for which we are known, drawing us closer together as a temple family, strengthening our resolve to meet the challenges that face us, and securing the blessings that will enable, one day, our descendants to look back with thanks upon this day, as they celebrate our 180th year.

HIGH HOLY DAY TICKETS

High Holy Day tickets may only be issued to TAS members who are in good standing. Children of TAS members through the age of 24 will not need their own tickets to attend services if a parent accompanies them. Tickets for children over age 24, other family members and non-Temple member guests may be purchased from the Temple office. Prices are \$90 for family members and \$360 for other guests. Please note that only one ticket for all services will be issued per person. With our new sanctuary we are able to accommodate your attendance at the service of your choice. **For security purposes, it is imperative that you bring your ticket with you to all services.**

HIGH HOLY DAY PRAYER BOOKS

It is customary for our members to bring their own prayer books to High Holy Day services. You may purchase *Gates of Repentance* in advance at the Temple office for a cost of \$25 each.

In our use of *Gates of Repentance* during our High Holy Day worship, you may have observed variations in the text between the older and newer editions. Our clergy conduct our worship utilizing the newer edition which differs in its gender sensitive features. Our clergy welcome any questions or concerns that you may have.

COLLEGE STUDENTS

Unaffiliated college students, studying or visiting in our area, may always attend services, without charge. If you know of such a student, please call the Temple Office at (858) 451-1200. Additionally, please furnish the school address and e-mail address of your college students so that we may be in touch with them throughout the year.

DISABLED SEATING/PARKING

We encourage disabled attendees to arrive early for the best parking and so that they will have the opportunity to sit where they are most comfortable. Please call the office if you will need any special accommodation. (858) 451-1200.

HEARING IMPAIRED

People with hearing loss may borrow a wireless audio headset to enjoy enhanced sound at our services. These sets will be available at the beginning of each service from our ushers.

FASTING

One of the main traditions of Yom Kippur calls upon us to fast so that we may deepen our spiritual awareness and introspection. While we certainly encourage healthy adults to observe Yom Kippur by fasting for the entire day, we also caution those who are ill or on medication should **NOT** fast. Moreover, children under the age of 13 have no obligation to fast within our tradition. If they wish to begin their preparations, they should be encouraged to go without dessert, or perhaps the normal in-between-meal snack. Teens who begin to feel ill should also be discouraged from fasting. Should you have any questions about the advisability of fasting, please contact your physician.

HUNGER PROJECT

Our Action for Social Justice Committee coordinates an Annual High Holy Day Food Drive. Please bring bags of packaged, non-perishable food to the Temple at Yom Kippur. The foods collected will go to support the Interfaith Community Center's food pantry.



DECORUM

Please help us contribute to a meaningful and worshipful atmosphere in our sanctuary. Unless **absolutely necessary, please turn off all cell phones and pagers. If you need to have them available, please cue them to vibrate, and take the call outside of the worship space.** We ask that parents please supervise their children. The outside courtyard is a good space to allow them to run off any energy they may need to release. Before entering or leaving the sanctuary, Jewish tradition is to wait if the ark is open, the Rabbi is delivering a sermon, or the Cantor is singing before proceeding. Please follow the usher's directions. Tallitot and kippot are not required, but are available, should you desire, at the entrances to our worship spaces.

TRAFFIC SAFETY

We strongly encourage carpooling if at all possible. A parking pass will be enclosed with your tickets. Please place the parking pass on your dashboard prior to arrival at services as security will be checking for these when cars enter the parking lot.

Once our parking lot is full, for the Contemporary Rosh Hashanah service and for Yom Kippur morning service, you will be directed to park a block away at St. Bart's Episcopal Church, which is on the right hand side of Pomerado, going north. There will be a shuttle available to bring you to the Temple. Please consider coming early to ensure arriving at services on time.

To ease traffic congestion, it would be helpful if those congregants leaving the Rosh Hashanah Traditional service would not linger so we might empty the parking lot quickly to give access to those arriving for the Contemporary service. Make sure to lock your vehicles and do not leave valuables visible.

CHILDREN'S PROGRAMMING

At High Holy Day morning services, there will be programs for children who are in the 4th Grade or younger. **Please see enclosed information and registration form.** We encourage students 5th Grade and older to attend the congregational service with their parents.

BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE

In the tradition of our people we add meaning to our Yizkor prayers on Yom Kippur through an act of tzedakah. You may perform this act of tzedakah by way of giving a voluntary contribution and remembering family or friends who have passed away by including them in the annual Temple Adat Shalom *Book of Remembrance* that is distributed on Yom Kippur. Children's Programming

During High Holy Day services, we provide services, art, music, games, and stories for children who are in the **4th GRADE OR YOUNGER**. Children are divided by age to ensure appropriate programming for each. These programs are available at a cost of \$18 per child, for two services, (both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur), or \$10, in advance, for only one service. To assure proper coverage, children **MUST BE PREREGISTERED IN ADVANCE**. If not pre-registered, we will do our best to accomodate them up until we are no longer allowed to care for more according to law. The for those not preregistered, is \$15 per service to be billed after the Holy Days.

Please indicate the number of children attending each session and register your child only for the service you plan to attend. We provide **NO CHILD CARE FOR EREV ROSH HASHANAH (September 8), FOR THE SECOND DAY OF ROSH HASHANAH (September 10), OR KOL NIDRE (September 17)**.

To register a child, please list their name, age, grade and the service you are attending, on the form below.

It is crucial that you fill out this form if you plan to have your child(ren) participate in our children's program as we hire staff based on expected attendance. The deadline to register is Friday, September 3.

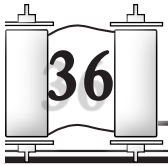
Your children's safety and well-being are important to us. That is why we absolutely require that you sign your children in at drop-off and sign them out when you pick them up. Thank you for your cooperation.
